How can it be resolved?

- Targeted rates, rebates or annual charges
- Wastewater systems treatment plant for Paparoa (and surrounds)
- Case by case individual solutions
- · Separate grey water from wastewater to reduce run off
- Composting toilets
- Connect similar groups in the community for holistic solutions

You also expressed concern the council may keep shifting goalposts, or if individuals pay for solutions they may be asked to pay again if a whole district scheme happens in the future and think it could be a whole district solution.

We Answered

- KDC have committed and hold \$60K in their Long-term plan to support Paparoa find a solution that works for everyone
- · No one knows how Three Waters reform may or may not provide solutions in the future
- The town will not be shut down, but individual properties could be given 'cease to use' orders if issues are not resolved.
- · Future proofing will benefit those not directly by ensuring the CBD of Paparoa can continue to provide services to the community, and the environment will be cared for.

What's next?

Using your ideas and information gathered, there are a few things I need you to have further input into. This will decide what you want to present to council as your recommended way forward.

Myself and members of the Progressive Paparoa Wastewater Group will be out in the community testing this before creating a roadmap for the way forward. There will be multiple opportunities for this, so keep an eye out for more information soon.



As part of this process

In August this year, council advised us

 40 out of 104 residential, commercial or industrially zoned properties that fall under the 2016 Wastewater Bylaw, have been tested to date. Of this, 27.5% had a problem, with inadequate room for modern compliance systems amongst them. Which properties are affected is confidential to council and property owners. Further testing will be carried out in Spring this year.
