Reflections on a Paparoa Life ..



Long time Paparoa identities Pam and Ian Pasley have moved to a new stage of life in Whangarei. Over many years they were very much involved in Paparoa life including, from an early age, Young Farmers, Kaipara Show Committee (President), Paparoa Lions (President), Farm Forestry Assn, and Keep Paparoa Beautiful. The cherry trees were a particular passion of Ian's. Ian has provided PP with his reflections on a Paparoa life:

"Pam and I have just had a moving experience! After nearly 80 years for me, and more than 57 years for Pam, we are now settled in a nice unit in a quiet street in Kensington, Whangarei. After all those years at Ararua and Paparoa, there are some reflections.

Our time here has been enjoyable. I was born in Nurse Cavell Memorial Hospital as were so many locals during the 60-odd years of its operation. When it closed, it marked the beginning of a whole series of closures: the Bank, the Post Office, Dalgety's, the Garage, the Chemist, and the Butcher, and finally our Rugby Club and the Bowling Club.

But the Community did not die. Today, the Village looks neat and tidy, and draws favourable comment from visitors. There is a great community spirit here.

The Pahi Regatta and the Paparoa Show have long passed their Centennial celebrations and we achieved 150 Years of settlement in Paparoa last year.

Throughout that time there continued a strong community spirit. In recent years, the 'New Guard' has filled the space of the 'Old Guard' who have moved on, passed on, or like us, have become much less active than we were in the past.

Many of our people still believe strongly in the maxim: "If you don't work for your Community, very soon you won't have one".

Paparoa is situated far enough from a large town or city to create a need for all the facilities we have. Tennis, table tennis



and badminton have all increased their membership.

The Show has changed its format and attracts large crowds. Our Sports Clubroom and the Memorial Hall have become great assets, as the result of many hours of community work. Not many communities have 15 hectares of parkland right in the middle of the village.

The so-called Holiday Highway creeps slowly northward, and will, no doubt, cause Paparoa to grow. Such growth may be years away, but you will cope, I'm sure.

Saturday and Sunday was the Point Curtis competition with the prize for the Biggest Kahawai heading home with the Gravy Boat. The team travelled out past the Graveyard at

the Kaipara Heads for one competition day but unfortunately the only catch was sharks. Gravy reports there are large number of 6-7 foot sand sharks about and they are taking the bait, hook and all.

The water temperature has jumped up from 17 degrees to 21 degrees in one week but there have not been many boats out on the water taking advantage of the perfect weather we have had lately. Gurnard have been a little hard to find but there are plenty of snapper about, not large ones, but still a reasonable size. Gravy recommends that you keep an eye to the fish finder when searching for the X spot. Favourite fishing pozzies have been a bit variable and if you can't get anything in half an hour, move elsewhere. There's no shortage of good places to fish in the Kaipara Harbour!

- 6 Remember the Skipper has all the Responsibility for a Safe Outing.



Last show we had the best turn out of cattle for many years plus it was Lockwood Smith's 'swansong' before going off to England. All competitors enjoyed the day and indicated they would like to be at the next show. If some new exhibitors could fill the gap left by the Woodleigh Belgian Blue team it would help Paparoa maintain its position as 'the best Beef Cattle Show in Northland'.

It was pleasing to see more young people showing their animals and one of the Judges noted that their level of confidence and competence has been steadily increasing each year.

Those competitors who wish to take part in the Malcolm Hutchings Young Handlers classes need to read the requirements carefully before thinking of entering as this is a section looking for more exacting conditions of exhibiting. It is, however, an important part of the showing scene and entries

are encouraged.

Owing to the lack of support and the fact that lambs are more like sheep by that time of the year there will be no more Pet Lamb classes and the Pet Goat classes are being transferred to the Dairy Goat section.

Dairy goat breeders strongly supported the re-introduction of classes at the last show and were delighted with both the facilities and turn out. A trophy was unearthed from the Kauri Museum and another is being donated for the champion dairy buck and dairy doe at this next show.

THE BUFFALOES

The earliest surviving records of The Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes show the founding of the first Lodge to have been in 1822 at the Harp Tavern near Drury Lane Theatre in London. It was created by stage hands and theatre technicians denied entry to an older club for actors and variety artists. The reasoning for the inclusion of antediluvian

in the title is unclear. It means 'before the flood'. As the members were associated with the theatre and were able to write their own ceremonies, material may have been embellished to impress non-members. It may have been a send-up aimed at the club from which they had been excluded.

In the late 1880s, the advent of the Seditious and Riotous Assemblies Act had a drastic effect on Lodge meetings so in order to show loyalty to the state, the word 'loyal' was added to the title. It soon became 'royal' and has remained so. The RAOB is a philanthropic and charitable body who raise funds through their meetings. The funds are used to assist members and their dependents where necessary or are donated back into the local community. In this area there are three Buffalo Lodges. Jubilee Lodge meets at Tinopai, Kiwi Lodge at Matakohe, and Luxinn-Wellsford Combined Lodge which meets at Maungaturoto. In 2013, the Buffaloes have donated almost \$10,000 to various causes in this area. If you are interested to learn more, phone Owen Stevens 09 431 7123.

Through the Looking Glass : from Auckland to *Fromage at Franklin*

Jas and Noel Futter have lived in Paparoa for 11 years. They arrived here in September 2002, one week after the Hinsches took over Paparoa Store, and just before Fiona and Nic moved into the National Bank building and turned it into *Sahara* restaurant.

The Futter's had been living in Ellerslie, Auckland, Noel working as a fitter and turner and Jas with her own business. A friend who worked in real estate mentioned that he was going up to Paparoa to take photos to market a there. "Paparoa," property thought Jas, "who'd live in that town?" In a previous life she had been the occupational health and safety nurse for New Zealand Post and had been to Paparoa for work. Shown the photos, they decided to go north for a look. Sitting outside in the sun, and amazed by the silence all around, neither spoke on the way back to Auckland. Within one week, the house was on the market and Jas and Noel had made an offer on the Paparoa property. Six weeks later they were living in Paparoa.

Noel worked full-time in the glasshouses, then on the land, while Jas worked part-time in her health and safety role. Noel has served in the Paparoa Volunteer Fire Force and has been the Fire Chief for several years.

Noel experienced an horrendous cycling accident in October 2007. Jas worked on through Noel's difficult convalescence, while at the same time they continued to operate the produce stall at Paparoa Farmers' Market which they had opened on the very first market day in January 2007.

Finally, Jas had to close the market stall and returned to work full-time in Auckland, while Noel remained in Paparoa. Now, five year's on, Jas has returned to

working part-time and so now has the time to devote to her new enterprise; cheese making.

Jas first got into cheese-making when she and Fiona attended a course and then made cheese together at Sahara. Following a visit to Fiona and Nic in Provence (where she ate a lot of cheese), Jas was persuaded to make cheese again. At the Paparoa Fire Force Christmas function last year, Jas's cheese was such a hit that people commented she should teach others how to make it. Noel converted part of the old packing shed to a cheese room, the necessary certification was obtained, and the first cheese class was held in February. Jas has had people from as far away as Nelson attend.

She offers a range of classes using cow or goat milk, covering

the making of: mascarpone, haloumi, mozza-rella, feta, goat's chevre, and butter. Farmhouse cheddar is a new course beginning in the New Year. As well as taking courses at home, Jas has been teaching in Wellington, and at the old Ohura State Prison, now a B&B, which belongs to the mother of Alan another previous *Sahara* owner.

If anyone is interested to learn cheese-making from Jas, contact her on 022 678 1474. A full range of cheese-making classes will be on offer over summer, or Jas is happy to arrange a class of your choice.

MORE SIGHTINGS OF RARE BIRD LIFE ...

Paparoa Press has enjoyed receiving some good feedback about 'banded rail' on the Lions' Bush Walkway since our editorial in the August edition.

FIRSTLY: an email from Robin Franklin of Matakohe ...

"It was great to read your report of the banded rail in August. When we began to occupy our block on Metcalfe Road in 1999 we were amongst the first in an undisturbed area. We heard strange calls in the night and saw an unknown bird take flight along the shoreline when disturbed.

Although born on a shoreline property elsewhere in a time when we had, amongst others, bellbirds in the buddleia outside the back door, a kaka ripping bark off the gum trees and fern birds in the manuka covered swamp, I had not seen or heard of the rail. The specimens in Auckland's Museum were no use for identification, having gone brown with age, but a friend produced a coloured picture which clearly identified the banded rail.

We realised that they were crossing from the shore from our north to southern side of the Metcalfe Road Peninsula (off Tinopai Road). Then I met a mother with a large clutch of small black chicks following a natural watercourse. Sadly the sightings got increasingly rare. Since the peninsula has been largely occupied and dogs and cats are always included, the rails have disappeared at least from here. I hope they may still inhabit the thick mangroves in the quieter shore areas. Being similar in size and movement to bantams they are 'easy meat'."

SECONDLY: Leslie & Karyn Tilby reported that they have a family of banded rail living in the vicinity of their home in Paparoa Station Road. Before the drought last summer they could be seen early morning and at dusk on the lawn, and were spotted a few times with three young chicks running behind them. Leslie has been trapping rats and mustelids and baiting possums for four years and this would be helping protect these birds; he says neighbours do not have cats which also helps the cause. The Paparoa Station Road valley has numerous areas of bush but also areas of wetland swamp, much of which is fenced

Motoring Matters

Last month I wrote about the Hillman *Imp*, an advanced rear engined car which turned out to be a production disaster. The vehicle which inspired the *Imp's* design was the VW *Beetle*, a car that everyone knows and was a complete success. What is less known is that the Beetle design owed a considerable amount to a Czechoslovakian gentleman who owned the *Tatra* factory near Prague. He in fact held several patents which were stolen by the Nazis, but could do nothing about the situation as Czechoslovakia was overrun by the Nazi forces.

factories around the world. After the war ended, the Tatra company took Volkswagen to court and won damages amounting to three million deutche marks in 1961. The Tatra company, the third oldest car maker in the world, still exists, building heavy trucks for cross country work. They have won the truck division of the Paris Dakar Rally several times. Their car production ceased in the early nineties, every one was rear engined. The pre-war cars in particular were very advanced, although rather strange looking with a huge fin over the engine cover at the rear of the car, which enabled the car to reach 100mph when most of its rivals struggled to do 70.



FINALLY, last month, while Jim (Rowlands) was busy monitoring mustelid traps on the Walkway, he saw a banded rail hen with two chicks in tow, on the mangrove mudflats. Perhaps there are more of you out there enjoying the sight of

these endangered wild fowl!







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Heritage Hotspot Pahi Wharf

On any day during the year, visitors or locals can be seen strolling out along Pahi Wharf. Along with the Moreton Bay Fig tree, the wharf is a major focal point for the reserve area at the end of the road. The original structure; heart totara piles with kauri decking and rails, 168 feet (51.2 metres) in length, was built in 1881. Over the years, the old wharf fell into disrepair and was demolished in the mid 1960s by a Navy blasting team on a training exercise. The outer piles were removed at ground level leaving the inner piles intact. These piles were then boarded across to form a groyne from the shore, approximately 10 metres in length, and that's how things stayed for the next 20 years.

In 1987, the then Otamatea Regatta Club celebrated its centenary with a three-day event. Dick Scott's book, *Seven Lives on Salt River* (winner of the 1988 NZ Book Award), was launched by then Prime Minister David Lange, who also officially opened the new wharf the next day, 10 January. The result of an idea raised at a club meeting about 20 months before, the new wharf had been realised so quickly due to a tremendous local effort collated by the Regatta Club. The plans (drawn by a local resident), were approved by the

Kaipara Harbour Authority who were then the administrators for the harbour, in record time and the hard work started.

Two farmers at Ararua donated all the trees necessary to provide the piles, and committee members felled, peeled and stacked them. Trees for the decking were provided by Pahi Road farmers and Otamatea County Council who gave permission for trees to be removed from the road reserve. The local sawmiller and timber treatment plant gave huge discounts for

their work, and cartage was also provided cheaply by another local resident.

The first pile was driven by a long reach digger early in November 1986. Bronze and copper bolts for the bracing were manufactured by a team working on the shore, from transformer rods sourced from an Auckland scrap metal dealer. The nuts for these were made by the local engineer from copper ingots cast in Whangarei. With the framework in place, a dedicated team spent many days hammering down the decking and the whole project was completed with time to spare. During the construction phase, the workers were well-fed and watered every day by a group of Pahi women as their contribution to the project. The total cost for the project was \$4,000, a tribute to the organisers and volunteers who gave so much time and hard work to see the project completed.



How about making your own greeting cards? Hand made cards are personal, fun and cheap and my family and friends say they love receiving the ones I make. And if you have a computer with a printer/ scanner/copier the possibilities are endless.



Try a simple card with your own photograph. You can buy packs of coloured cards with matching envelopes, or buy coloured card from the variety shops and fold your own. They stock all sizes of envelopes too. Stick all photos or images on with glue stick or any dry glue (not pva) and press down firmly. Photos from family holidays or special occasions work well - a decorated tree, a festive table, children in fancy dress.

Any small artwork or cut pieces of painting, printing or fabric can replace the photo, or you can use the copier to shrink a child's drawing to size.

Have fun with your scanner creating interesting images by placing small fresh flowers, leaves, ferns, thread, ribbon, sequins etc. on the glass. These can be modified with crushed fabricslayers of net, fine silk, lace in front or behind. Check the results in the 'preview' window of your scanner, and when you are satisfied, print onto everyday quality photo paper. Cut to photo size and use as above.

You can hand letter text, buy sheets of rub-on letters, or print onto coloured paper and cut out in a banner shape to glue on top or beside the image.

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The Evans Family - Tin & Coppersmiths, Hook Road

James Poynton Evans came to New Zealand, with his wife Emma and their nine children, in 1883 on one of the first steamdriven ships to come to this country. He first operated an









ironmonger's business in Christchurch but was advised to move north for health reasons. He came to Paparoa in 1884.

James Evans was an expert tinsmith and he, and his youngest son after this, served the district in this field. James' son built the house and workshop opposite the Methodist Parsonage in Hook Road and operated from there as a Tin & Coppersmith. Daniel was known for his copper 'Danny Kettles', some of which can now be seen in the Kauri Museum.

James Evans was noted for his walking feats as well as for the severe seasickness he suffered if he travelled by boat.

It was in 1885 that he took his wife to Pahi and saw her safely on board the steamer that was to take her to Helensville where she would entrain for Auckland. James then set out for Auckland on foot and completed the journey in time to meet his wife's train when it arrived! Once when walking from Opotiki to Paparoa he was offered a bottle of whiskey to help him on his way.

"I took it," he said, "but I've seen too many men ruined by that stuff ever for me to drink it. I rubbed it on my feet which were beginning to get sore."

The horseman was far in front for the first 40 miles but the eventual winner by a substantial margin was the man on foot.

Many of James and Emma Evans's ten children settled in Northland.




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Deal or No Deal
