Pursuant to Section 22(2) of the Forest and Rural Fires Act 1977 the Kaipara District Council hereby declares a Prohibited Fire Season to be in force **from midnight Friday 1st March 2013, until further notice**.

The Prohibited Season will remain in force until weather conditions and fire danger indicators warrant it's uplifting, and applies to all land in the Kaipara District except land administered by the Department of Conservation, where a prohibited fire season is already in force.

This notice **cancels any fire permit issued** for this period.

The lighting of any fire in the open air is prohibited.

Become a Friend of the Privet Posse


Expressions of interest are being sought by The Lions Club of Paparoa,

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Through the Looking Glass : Randall Haines

It is nearly 40 years since Randall Haines first visited New Zealand. Back home in Canada and unable to settle, he applied to emigrate and, as cabinet making was an acceptable trade, was accepted and is now a Canadian Kiwi.

Attracted to the Kaipara, Randall met Liz Kay from Matakohe and they were married, settling on the Kay family farm for a time before purchasing the Paparoa Post Office building when it came up for sale in the 1980s.



The premises were converted to a B&B and Backpackers run by Liz, and Randall continued cabinetmaking in the sheds down the road and opened a business in old Nick's Shop, next to the guest house, where he sold the "Shaker" furniture he made.



While still running the B&B business, Randall and Liz bought the derelict Quaife House just up the road on SH12, moved it to it's present site below Nick's Shop and started restoration. The guest house was sold, Liz

enrolled for teacher training and Randall moved into houseboat building. He built two, and chartered them for eight years, at the same time building and selling traditional Canadian canoes. Randall had always owned a canoe at home in Canada where going canoeing is regarded much the same as riding a bike.

These days he is still making furniture and canoes, which are sold in the recently opened shop in front of the workshop, and restoring furniture for private clients.

Motorbikes have always been a hobby, Randall owns four, and motorbikes are at the heart of his new venture. Before coming to NZ, he had spent a lot of time in Asia, and in the last 5 years he and Liz have travelled widely there. In 2012 his cousin came to visit for the first time in 25 years. Randall had just escorted a group of friends and family on a bike trip to Cambodia. Share riding with others in Asia became the central topic for discussion and before you know it, a new business was born, "Over the Hill and Back Adventure motorcycle tours for old buggers". The cousin takes care of business in North America and Randall handles the Pacific area. Tours are offered to North Vietnam where travellers are escorted north of Hanoi to the Laos/China border area. An interpreter / guide accompanies the group and accommodation




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
is in mountain hotels or in village homes where the visitors are treated as part of the family. The fourth tour to this area leaves in April.

Last year Randall spent a month in India reconnoitring for a new tour. Starting in the Himalayan foothills at 8,000 feet and climbing to 18,400 feet above sea level (the highest motorable road in the world), where it ends 30 kilometres from the Pakistan border. The Indian Army controls this area and provides a first aid station at the top of the road where travellers can access oxygen. Randall laughs at the height. When he piloted a Cessna 172 for 10 years as a Coastguard pilot, the maximum height he could fly was 14,500 feet; lower than the height the tour reaches in the Himalayan foothills!

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The Role of an Ambulance Officer

An Ambulance Officer is part of a team that provides pre-hospital emergency care; is trained to respond to a wide range of medical emergencies, to assess and treat patients then transport them to further care if required. Motivation and commitment to ambulance duties (at least one rostered shift per week) and training sessions are required. This ensures high levels of skill development and patient care.

There is no age limit but good physical health and a full driver's licence is required. A current Workplace First Aid Certificate is helpful.

To become an operational member of St John means completing an application form, Police and personal reference checks, written and physical assessments and attending an interview. Applicants may attend team training nights and are encouraged to ride in the ambulance as observers.

St John provides free training for volunteer staff up to and including the Paramedic qualification. Maungaturoto and Kaiwaka ambulance stations are primarily crewed by volunteers with one paid Ambulance Officer in support. As part of emergency services, the ambulance team works closely with police, fire and rescue helicopter teams.

The title of Ambulance Officer applies to all, with other terms

depending on levels of training:

First Responders have some advanced first aid training with driving training.

Emergency Medical Technicians complete the National Diploma in Ambulance Practice.



Paramedics complete further study and provide a wider range of treatments.

Intensive Care Paramedics study at University. They provide Advanced Life Support and an extensive range of treatments and procedures. Volunteers living close to the station receive a personal pager for call-outs. Those living further afield stay at the station or in the local area while on duty. The ambulance stations at Maungaturoto and Kaiwaka have dedicated facilities for on-duty volunteers.

St John could not provide a quality ambulance response without the support of local volunteers. Some of the training can be challenging, but we offer plenty of support and assistance. Becoming a Volunteer Ambulance Officer helps your local community while the training provided may assist with gaining future employment.

KAIPARA LIFE - GENTLE GIANT

Summer on the Kaipara can be magic and this year with all those hot sunny days the beach at Whakapirau was at its very best and I spent many happy hours there thinking how lucky I was to have this little piece of kiwi paradise right on my door step.

The summer months however, with so many more people in the water, can produce some interesting encounters like this one with a local stingray.

One particularly hot day, so the story goes, friend Nigel decided to go for a swim. On this occasion he was keen to try out his flippers and so, suitably attired, he began his careful backward manoeuvres out into the tide. Unbeknownst to him however he was heading straight for a very large stingray that was cruising the shallows.

Unfortunately stingrays have quite poor eyesight - relying instead on their sense of smell, and, as our 'would be' swimmer was apparently very clean and also very quiet, the ray, like Nigel, was blissfully unaware of the inevitable collision. Then Nigel's foot came down on the ray's head. Shocked by the impact the huge ray surged out of the water rising part way up Nigel's legs in the process and beat a frantic retreat into the safety of deeper water. Nigel did something similar but with much less grace - he was more like a human windmill, arms flapping, flippers splashing, emitting just the hint of a manly scream, madly scrambling his way back to the beach.

Now, in spite of the bad press they have received since Steve Irwin met his tragic end, stingrays are not particularly dangerous creatures. In fact, according to ACC statistics, you are 60 times more likely to be killed tripping over a rug than by being injured by one of these gentle giants.

Still at the moment of impact I doubt that statistics had any part to play in the reactions of either party. It was Near Death Experience for all concerned and, for that brief moment, the magic of a summer's day on the Kaipara was well and truly shattered.

Pets in the Valley 🕮 🎉

Seeing water is quite topical at the moment I thought I'd touch on the subject as regards our pets.

A frequently asked question at veterinary consults is "how much water does your animal drink?" The honest answer for most people is "I don't know" especially with cats as who knows when and where they obtain moisture from, anywhere from

the bath, toilet, and puddles. The little bowl by the cat biscuits is probably the last place they drink from! I guess the most important thing is the impression of how desperately they are after water. There are at least 10 medical conditions where polydypsia (excess drinking), also accompanied by the necessary polyuria (excessive urination), are important clinical signs. Diabetes, kidney failure, Cushings (dogs) and hyperthyroidism would be the most common. Dogs are much easier when it comes to measuring their water intake,

as many are kennelled, and it's easy to tell if you are filling the bowl up more often. With dogs the next step of obtaining a urine

sample is also much easier! Obviously in dry, hot conditions like these, healthy animals are going to drink lots of water, and I'm sure some dogs drink it just because they like it.

Technically the requirement for adult animals is 40 to 60ml/ kg/day. An animal drinking in excess of 100ml/kg/day would be considered polydypsic. So keep the water bowl full and clean and fresh for humans and animals alike !


