These 'Indian Summer' conditions are also creating some beautiful sunsets. Indian summer is defined as a period of unseasonably warm settled weather after the end of summer proper. The term was first used in 1778 by John Hector St. John de Crevecour of rural New York to describe a 'short interval of smoke and mildness'! PP

Farming Report

Hi my name is Ken Hames and my wife Janine and I are beef and dairy farmers.

There has been unseasonably little rainfall over the last few months and the effects of this extended dry period have certainly been felt on the farm. While it has been challenging to feed stock, on some farms there has also been an issue around sufficient water for stock. Last week I was at a presentation where the Minister for Primary

Industries was speaking and his main point was that we only collect for storage 2% of rainfall in New Zealand.

In NZ we are lucky compared to other countries in that we do have sufficient rainfall, it's just not spread evenly throughout the year. This has got me thinking about our farm and, while we have got through this dry period okay, we would be struggling if the drought had been two months longer. So next year we will be investing in another dam in order to ensure there is a backup supply available. Let's hope it's many years before it's needed to be used. Given that nowadays there is greater volatility in climatic conditions, as farmers we need to ensure that we can cope with that volatility.

As I write this the weather has turned and rain is falling signalling the ending of the drought.

INTERNATIONAL RALLY of WHANGAREI Saturday 18 & Sunday 19 May

Look out for extra traffic on our roads for the International Rally of Whangarei held on Saturday 18 and Sunday 19 May. Reconnaissance day Thursday 16.

The action kicks off from 8am Saturday morning with the route taking competitors over roads



around Parahi in the southwest, Waipu Caves and Brooks – including the Swamp Road 'Hella' jump. They return to Whangarei for the 1.5km Pohe Island 'Super Special' stage. The route is repeated in the afternoon.

Sunday begins at 6:55am and heads south through Waipu Gorge and on to Marohemo and Batley Road, visiting Paparoa's Wairere-Station Roads and Arcadia-Cassidy Roads. The route is repeated before the Whangarei Quayside Town Basin ceremonial finish from 3:15pm.

Special Stages: roads closed 6.15am-3pm with two passes starting 8.54am and 1.09pm. Reconnaissance Day 1st Pass starts 9.45am & 2nd Pass 10.15am.

This means the Fire Ban has been lifted and you may now light fires in the open air without a permit.

Please be careful, check the area around your fire is clear and you have no overhanging branches or power lines. Also, be sure to have a water supply at hand. Recently a small fire was ignited by fallen power lines. Some members of the public had put the fire out before we arrived.

PLEASE DO NOT DO THIS! Downed power lines may potentially be alive or be relivened without notice, and electrocution can occur up to several meters away. Those involved are lucky they were not seriously injured or killed.

If you see any power lines down, please stay clear and phone Northpower on 0800 10 40 40

to report it.



Heritage Hotspot

February 11th 1925

A new Railway station building is erected at Paparoa

When you drive past Paparoa Railway Station these days, it's difficult to envisage what this spot once looked like and how busy it was ... Justice has been done to settlers in the anticipation of substantial traffic from Paparoa and contributing districts westward to the Northern Wairoa River by the erection of well-equipped buildings at Paparoa railway station. The station building comprises five rooms. including the stationmaster's office, two waiting rooms and a storeroom, with an extensive platform, roomy goods shed, and stock loading stage. The stationmaster's residence is furnished with up-to-date conveniences. Other railway officers' houses were built some time back.

The approach roads to the station are finished and metalled. The station is the next largest in size to Waiotira

on the Huarau-Portland section. Foundations are laid for a large tank for the engine. The metalling of the main road is proceeding down Paparoa Valley to the township, and is being rapidly pushed on. This road is on splendid grade. It is popular with motorists, it avoids steeper grades on the road to Huarau and Maungaturoto stations, and it completes the metalled highway from Paparoa station to Northern Wairoa via Matakohe, Ruawai and Mititai.

Homebuilders' History

Homebuilders Community Services has now become Otamatea Community Services, and this seems a good time to consider its history and how it came to be.

The first Homebuilders was set up in 1989 as Rose Plunkett of . Maungaturoto Care and Share responded to a Government initiative to provide home-based support for families with atrisk children. The group came together: Rose, Rosemary Jones, Jan Robinson, Stephanie Wilson, Sophianna Tipene, Ann Dewhurst and later on Patricia Hunt. All underwent rigorous training including study at The Auckland College of Education, and of The Treaty of Waitangi. Peter and Martha Walters were Kaumatua and Kuia, advising on cultural issues. Most of these people continued active involvement for over a decade of dedicated work as the clientele expanded rapidly.

Homebuilders' policy was to have a small infrastructure, with a discreet office, set up in Rose Plunkett's home, for paperwork and for contact with government agencies. This was approved by the Community Funding Advisor as a secure environment. The prime focus was giving confidential support within the client's home. The Management Committee included lawyers, counsellors and local identities providing skilled supervision and community input.

The Department of Social Welfare and Community Funding Agency put in considerable time and effort setting up *Homebuilders* in accordance with Government directives, and in the early years used it as a pilot group working with consultants to write and test new systems.

Rose, Rosemary, Jan, Patricia and several others left a changed organisation some five years ago, but Rose and Rosemary, still seeing a need for an organisation run strictly on the founding principles of *Homebuilders*, started **Youth and Whanau Focus South Kaipara Inc.** This organisation is approved under standard S403 of the CYFS Act 1989 and receives referrals from CYFS, police, schools, health providers, as well as self-referrals.

Rose, Rosemary and those involved in the early *Homebuilders* thank the community for their support, and for their much appreciated ongoing support for *Youth and Whanau Focus South Kaipara Inc.*

If you hear lots of loud noises on the morning of Saturday 4 May, don't be alarmed. It's the first day of the Shooting Season. Shooters can visit website:



MUSEUM MUSINGS ...

On Wednesday 5th April a small group of staff and volunteers drove up to Towai to watch Kauri logs, buried for over ten thousand years, being excavated from what is normally a swamp, but with the drought which has lasted nearly three months, conditions are just right to locate and bring to the surface such examples.

Johnathan Palmer first introduced us to his colleagues; another scientist in the field of dendrochronology, and two German scientists who wished to film the proceedings for a documentary to appear on German TV.

Johnathan explained how the timber was located. There are three methods: the most sophisticated being the use of ground

radar using satellite technology, secondly by watching for areas of dried grass, and third with a kauri gum spear, which can be more accurate than either of the other two methods.

A large digger was used to find and dig up the logs and it was quite uncanny to see

how easily the driver was able to just put the bucket into the earth and immediately bring up sizeable pieces of timber which had not seen the light of day for millenia.

After a short break for lunch, the digger started up again and within minutes it was struggling to lift what was obviously a substantial log. A bulldozer was called up, a deep hole dug on either side of what was now obviously a tree trunk and a hawser passed around it, the bulldozer took the strain, its front well up in the air, and, with the help of the digger, over ninety feet of trunk and a limb were lifted.

That was the crowning moment of a fascinating day, and all the time, traffic was passing by on State Highway one, blissfully unaware of the little piece of history unfolding only two hundred metres away.

... Finding Inspiration

Where do the ideas for artwork come from? There is a popular impression that inspirations are like butterflies, floating free in the air and some people are just naturally better at catching them than others. But actually, they are more like plants, growing slowly from carefully nurtured seeds within your life and your practice.

If you are considering making a piece for this year's wearable art gala, try these three steps. Firstly, what making processes do you enjoy: dressmaking, patchwork, metal craft, collage, embroidery, knitting, painting, construction? What materials do you like to work with and can find easily? Then, what interests you in your life: love your garden, fishing, dance, science, children, collecting?

Looking at entries from WOW in Wellington shows how these come together; a saddler making a surreal horse from leather, a dress made from souvenir teaspoons, another from fine laths of wood by a boat builder. Pieces based on children's story characters, Pacific legends, mythical animals: waste materials from the farm, industry, the home.

Making art to wear is a unique field with such a short history that it carries no burden of expectation of how to "do it right". As a Kiwi specialty we approach it with an open, experimental, accepting approach, and value everyone who attempts to give it a go.

I'm doing it again this year, with my granddaughter as my model once more. As she says, *"It's our 'thing'"*. And for Paparoa it is too, our 'thing'. Helen Budd
