## Many eyes on river bank

Representatives from KDC, NRC and NZ Transport Agency met with Progressive Paparoa Inc recently to discuss a common approach to the development of the riverbank adjacent to Paparoa village. The gathering was coordinated by Adrian Birkbeck, Parks and Reserves Officer from KDC. He said it was important that everybody with an interest in the area between The Landing and the Village Green was on the same page. As NZTA is the land owner there are certain procedures that have to be followed. However NZTA has delegated authority day-to-day to KDC.

This actually means the community will get more input from KDC in the way of weed control and provision of plants. PPI is keen to develop a landscape plan for the area which can be implemented in stages. NRC have agreed to include the possibility of a boardwalk on the riverbank as part of long term flood protection measures.

PPI deputy chair Graham Murray said that while it is disappointing our voluntary efforts won't be able to continue, it is really good to get all the parties on board. The riverbank is the one blight on a really attractive area.

Another plus is that we won't be in danger of running foul of OSH requirements.

## **Vegetables at the Farmers' Market**

If you haven't already spotted it, fresh vegetables are once again readily available at the regular two weekly Paparoa Farmers' market. Ali and Mai Ling travel down from Dargaville and all their produce is sourced from other local growers who regularly sell at the Whangarei growers' market. Fresh eggs are back too, as Chum Jones will replace Evan Murphy who is unable to continue



as a stallholder.

All the other stalls are there: plants, honey, seafood, chocolate, olive oil, flowers, fruits, soaps, pickles, sauces and chutneys, meats and bbq bacon and egg sandwiches, with buskers to entertain and add to the atmosphere.

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## Valuable feedback received on Lifestyle Village proposal

The Steering Committee for Paparoa's Lifestyle Village has received most welcome feedback from the questionnaire it recently sent to the community.

Some of the responses were from the Pioneer Lunch attendees but a pleasing number of the wider community have also taken time to respond.

Forty-five percent of respondents answered 'yes' or 'possibly' to the question "If a Lifestyle Village existed now in Paparoa would you consider purchasing a unit?" Committee Chair, Graham Taylor said that this is an encouraging number and should be taken in the context that many senior people have already made arrangements for their later years. Interestingly a majority of people thought the minimum age should be either 55 or 60 years indicating a preference for being able to enter the village while still relatively young.

Graham wished to thank all those who responded with their answers and valuable comments. He said there is a huge amount for the Steering Committee to consider, but all information from the community is valued. The committee hopes to have a Scheme Plan available within a few weeks so more detailed costings can be done. It is hard to imagine what the concept will look like without lines drawn on a plan. [PP]

# NRC works to reduce flooding

Recent work by Northland Regional Council on the bed of the Paparoa Stream should reduce the flooding problem that occasionally plagues Paparoa Village.

A considerable quantity of debris and gravel has been removed from the stretch of river approaching The Landing and also further upstream above Skelton's Bridge. NRC's Nick Gordon, River Management Engineer, met with community representatives and explained that the preventative work should help alleviate flooding.

Debris in the river slows the flow and catches other debris which could impede the water getting away. Any vertical structure such as tree trunks will catch debris while low bushes and flaxes will bend with the flow and not cause a problem. Nick said he was keen to work with the Paparoa community to find solutions to the flooding problems and recognised the beautification efforts undertaken.

There had been concerns that the pohutukawa trees planted by Keep Paparoa Beautiful had been damaged, but the contractor has already replaced them. PP

## Cherry trees arouse passions

Last month's exposure of the village cherry trees being potentially an invasive pest species has sparked a fair degree of community interest.




An online search has revealed that the Taiwan Cherry (Prunus Campanulata) is also known as the Tui Tree due to the fondness tuis have for its nectar.

There are other varieties of flowering cherries that do not seed but not this one. It has been suggested that the variety we have is sterile but this has yet to be proven. The seedlings sprouting in nearby gardens would suggest otherwise.

In order to discuss the issue and sort out the facts, PPI has invited Sara Brill, Northland Regional Council Bio-Security Officer to speak at a community gathering at 1pm on Thursday 14th May. This will be held at the Village Green carpark so the trees in question can be viewed. All are welcome to voice their opinions and hopefully come up with some answers.

The community can be assured that no action will be taken until there are clear facts confirming the status of these trees.

## Everybody's Reading Room

*Everybody's Reading Room* is a new play inspired by actual events in Kaipara during World War 1.

Alfred Gregory was a Dargaville draper, Quaker, and antimilitarist (as they were known in those days - nowadays we would call him a peace activist). He was imprisoned for sedition when he refused to display a military service registration poster in 1916.

I first learned of Gregory's stand through an historical article in the Kaipara Lifestyler in 2007. The experiences of wartime conscientious objectors like Archie Baxter and others who refused to fight have been well documented, but Gregory's story is practically unknown.

I have taken extensive literary license with the facts, fictionalising his story and all the characters, but the core of the plot is based around his act of civil disobedience during wartime. The play explores conscience and ideology, and is haunted throughout by the ghost of Anglo/Irish philosopher and playwright, World War 1. George Bernard Shaw, who also opposed the war,

though for pragmatic, rather than pacifist, reasons.

I am in contact with one of Gregory's granddaughters, and members of the family are coming to see the play.


The play is recommended for audiences aged 13 and up, directed by Alister Williams and produced by *Platform Thirteen*, a non-profit community theatre group.

Its cast of nine has been in rehearsal since February.

Cast and production team come from an area that encompasses Dargaville, Waipu, Wellsford and all points in between.

The play opens on 30 May in Dargaville, with the following weekend, 6-7 June at ORT Maungaturoto, and 13-14 June at Forum North, Whangarei.

From our family to yours

In 2010 our family, then consisting of two little boys, my husband and I, migrated from Auckland to Pahi, 🚽 our first foray into living rurally.

This eye-opening account will be an introduction to living sustainably and economically, thereby helping other families to cut down on costs and chemicals.

Moving from 800 sq metres in Massey to 13 acres was always going to be a mental hurdle. Transforming bare land to edible wilderness was a physical one. Our ethos from day one was and is - to live as guardians of the land, kaitiaki. To restore and enhance this environment with respect and gratitude for the abundance that the earth strives to provide. And we have a long way to go in our little block.

With the arrival of our third son in 2011, the ordinary trials and tribulations of daily life took precedence. An overwhelming sense that this project was too large put the groundwork on hold. Looking back, we realise we needed to see it piece by piece, not as a single project. A lot of basic learning was done, the best kind of experience, hard won through failure.

Watching has been the best lesson - watching the seasons, the patterns, the animals, and waiting for the right moments, waiting to plant, waiting to sow. Living urban we had lost knowledge that rural dwellers might have not, but it feels good to re-learn the old ways, simple and true.

Our best decision was to choose Paparoa as home; the support of all those we have met has been warm, and our need for genuine community has been filled - another thing to re-learn, as sadly you do not find this in Auckland's mad rush.

## Nepal - a country of contrasts very old and very modern!

Kathmandu is a crowded city with the many narrow streets filled with overloaded bicycles (many with trailers), rickshaws and more commonly, motorbikes, scooters, cars (many very nice modern ones), buses and decorated TATA trucks. Traffic moves very slowly most of the time and is controlled at bigger intersections by brave policemen standing in the middle. Speed is also kept down by the many huge potholes. [This piece written prior to the recent earthquake, see note below]

The air is filled with dust from the road and building sites, as well as from pollution.



Ancient temples date from the 1500s with intricate wooden carving. One of the temples incorporated both Hindu and Buddist religion. A pity more of the world could not follow this example of the acceptance of

others' beliefs in one place.

After a 7 hour journey of 200k on interesting roads with

irregular driving speeds, we were delighted to escape the city and head off trekking in the Annapurna region.

The first day began with an uphill climb on slate steps and paths

to Damphus. The villages on the very steep slopes amazed me. Every bit of land is used, with stone walls

around each terraced garden. As it was very early spring, many gardens had yet to be ploughed and planted but the potato, peas, bok choy and



wheat were well cared for.

My son, lan, had a go at

ploughing with two buffalo

and a wooden plough but unfortunately the buffalo did

not understand English and

stopped to eat a tree! The local farmer laughed and then

At nearly 2000 metres up,

we walked through villages

showed how it was done.

Carrying loads of rice or cement or rocks up the pathways - no roads here

and forest with flowering red rhododendrons. That dav we finished our walk by 1pm and were able to spend all afternoon to chat and play games at the town of Potana. Three more days of trekking took us through many towns, great tea house lodges with solar heated hot showers and flush toilets and occasional good views of Annapurna Machhapuchhre (Fish and tail, sacred mountain). we saw teams of 8 donkeys and ponies with elaborate headgear and bells around their necks carrying large gas

bottles, cement and rice up steep stairs. We saw many school children all in very tidy

> uniforms skipping up steep stairs of stone with ease on the way to school.

There were trekkers from many different countries with Sherpas carrying huge loads, even one Sherpa carrying the young daughter of a trekking family. The heavy loads were carried using a strap

around the forehead as well as the usual shoulder straps. Quite elderly people were also frequently seen carrying huge loads with ease up and down the hills.

All in all what a privilege to be able to visit a great country and meet some of their people.

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# Pets in the Valley 🕵 🞉

GDV is an acronym that sends alarm bells for vets. It stands for Gastric Dilation and Volvulus - a blown up and twisted stomach - which can occur very suddenly in dogs and has a high fatality rate. If the dog is still alive by the time it reaches a vet clinic, it is immediately obvious what the problem is.

Unusually, the other day I had a GDV dog brought in very early in the process of the stomach distending. While it was apparent she was painful in her abdomen, there was still a large number of disorders that could have been causing her symptoms. While we were waiting for an xray of her stomach to be developed, I could see her abdomen increasing in size before me and realised that we has a GDV on our hands. We went straight into surgery for her stomach to be deflated and the initiating cause was removed (not sure what it was but it was furry). The stomach quickly returned to its normal position and was then "tacked" in place to prevent reoccurrence.

Dog recovered very well after surgery although trying to keep her quiet while she healed after the surgery was going to be a problem for the owners to deal with!

This case demonstrated how the dog's owners responded quickly to what seemed a minor issue – the dog was not barking and not her normal bouncy self and they promptly bought her to the clinic. Living close by was also an advantage for a good outcome.

So don't go for a run after a big meal!

### **Motoring Matters**

Not long after I arrived in NZ, I was reminded that in less than 100 years New Zealand had established a road network that had taken the countries of Europe many centuries to build. Roman Roads were built over 2000 years ago, and, if you take England as an example, there were hundreds of small villages and hamlets, all interconnected with footpaths and wagon tracks.

Here, in the early 1800s, there was hardly anything, just a few paths through steep bush, almost all transport was by sea and river and it stayed that way until the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Slowly, from the 1850s, the paths were expanded by the new settlers, pathways became bullock tracks which, in turn, became rudimentary roads until the arrival of the motor car, when some impetus was put into making roads usable in all weather.

However, as late as 1917, the roads of Northland were still in an abominable state and a local Member of Parliament organised a tour of Northland by car for twenty five MPs to witness the state of the roads.

Today, we still seem to lag behind many other parts of rural New Zealand. To the south of Auckland, many country roads are sealed and a pleasure to drive on.

To the north, it is a different story, even close to the city, many roads around Albany were not sealed until the late 1990s and, to make matters worse, in 2009 the government decreed that no more seal extensions would be funded.

Perhaps, one day, the powers that be will realise that Northland needs good roads as well as two way bridges.

Tatiana remembers making a sheep cake for a farmer, it made people laugh first then appreciate the taste! The sailing ship cake she made for a neighbour's birthday will also




be long remembered.


## Pahi stingray fascinates
