



Planting ... for the bees

Simple ways to help offset the alarming decline in honeybee populations: the native bee needs access to pollen and nectar sources all year. The critical time is from late autumn through to late spring when the hive is needing supplies to get through winter and then to build up numbers after low winter levels.

Native plants flowering over this period include lacebark, five finger, kowhai, & cabbage trees; ngaio, brooms, coprosma; kanuka, manuka; wineberry, karaka & rewarewa; also the pittosporums kohuhu, lemonwood, and karo. Hebes & flax are also good.

Exotics and herbs include phacelia, goldenrod,

borage, rosemary, lavender & sage. Most importantly, DO NOT use insecticides in your garden or farm and encourage friends and family to act similarly. The much-used imidacloprid-containing-sprays (eg: Safer, Bayer Advanced, Ortho) are all lethal to bees in particular and to other beneficial insects. This chemical breaks down slowly and maintains toxicity in foliage and soil, even moving in water to waterways. Vital micro-organisms are killed off and eventually soil is adversely affected.

Pets in the Valley I

It's that time of the year again where pet lambs are running around the lawn and calves are being dragged around in an attempt to make them obedient by calf club day. The mission is to keep them alive and healthy until the big day.

I drove all the way to Waipu one Sunday night to see a sick pet calf. It died before I got there

and their pet dav was on the Monday, very sad.

Lambs are even better at being healthy one moment and dying the Most next. issues arise

from gut disorders.

A few tips for increasing survival rates: Don't overfeed, more is not better. No sudden changes of feed, find out what the lamb has been given when you get it and try to give it the same, half and half if you are going to be using a different milk source. Be very careful with mixing rates if you are using milk powder, too dilute and the milk won't clot in their abomasum, too concentrated and the lamb will be dehydrated.

Use plain yoghurt in the milk especially when they are young. A tablespoon in each feed is enough, don't be in a hurry to

> make their teat hole larger it may make feeding quicker but the more sucking an animal does the better. Use 5-in-1 vaccine from

a young age or even better 10 in 1 vaccine and, last but not least, make sure your lamb is not nibbling on any poisonous or even not obviously poisonous plants when wandering around the garden. Have a great time

KAIPARA LIFE: The great Snapper debate

A proposal to reduce recreational snapper bag limits in Area 1 has caused much consternation among Kaipara's recreational fishers. Many fear that a big cut in the East Coast bag limits will simply result in a transfer of recreational fishing effort from the Whangarei area into the Kaipara fishery.

While I am not convinced that the actual reduction will be as harsh as that currently being suggested (a bag limit of 3 snapper), I do think that local fishers have good reason to worry.

After all if you are going out for a day's fishing it would make sense to fish where you can get the best return for your time and money. So therefore it is very likely that the Kaipara snapper fishery will pay the price for a big reduction in East Coast bag limits.

There are other problems with this proposed solution as well:

Firstly, one of the major flaws is the size of the fishery management areas. Area 1 is huge and should

not be managed on a 'one size fits all' basis. Placing the threat posed by Auckland, with its burgeoning population, in the same category as that in areas such as Whangarei makes no sense to me. On top of this there could well be large stretches of the East Coast where very little recreational fishing takes place at all.



A second concern is the reliability of the information on the size of the recreational catch. Working out just how much fish is actually out there and who is getting how much is not an exact science. Random boat ramp checks, telephone and aerial surveys can only ever paint part of the picture. So do we really know how big the problem is?

Thirdly, the commercial fishery

does have a tarnished reputation with regard to high grading and illegal dumping. Given the quantities of fish discarded in this way, many recreational fishers feel they are being punished for problems not of their making.

Fourthly, I applaud the trawler man who has worked out a better way to configure his net so that

smaller fish could escape. I only wish that MPI (the Ministry for Primary Industries) would take steps to promote such innovation, instead of absolving themselves of any responsibility by saying they don't employ 'input controls'.

Finally I know that cost is a big factor these days for recreational fishers - buying, maintaining and running a boat not to mention the price of fishing gear - has already put this iconic pastime beyond the reach of a lot of Kiwis.

At the end of the day we all want the same thing - a healthy and sustainable fishery - but I can't see that this proposal will get us any closer to that.

I thought of the huge, heavy sculptures I had made in stone, plaster and steel and envied her. I made a vow never again to make art that I couldn't easily carry around. But I still do.


Wearable art is defined by the human body, but is by no means confined by its size. It is a challenge to stretch the boundaries of what can be attached to a body and yet be carried around. To make maximum impact on the stage we reach out and up, pushing the limits of size and weight. And now I'm making pieces that I can barely fit into the car.

But there is life after the wearable arts gala. I'm planning new work, using the techniques I have developed. I can see sculptural pieces, no longer

dictated by wearability. I see them stretch further out, and further My favourite technique is to build my sculptures, adding individual components, one at a time. I stand back and consider the form before deciding what to add next. And the pieces grow.

I also have a block of Oamaru stone waiting to be carved. It's too cold to work outside, I need it in the studio. If only I could move it by myself.


